AR1370 (A3): Visual Fundamentals II - 3 (3-0-3) 90 Hours for 15 Weeks

CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:

A studio-based course with emphasis on the understanding of two and three dimensional design dynamics of visual form. A basic course where you will be introduced to various concepts and projects using a variety of art media. The second part of the course will build upon the knowledge of Part I and study color theory.

PREREQUISITE(S)/COREQUISITE: AR1360

REQUIRED TEXT/RESOURCE MATERIALS: No text required – assigned readings will be provided. Students will be supplied a list of required materials.

DELIVERY MODE(S): Lecture and Lab

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

- 1. To teach students to perceive, identify and apply the basics of elements of art, principles of design and the creative process. They will begin to communicate visually expressed information while understanding abstract and pictorial relationships.
- 2. To equip students with a visual and verbal vocabulary pertaining to art.
- 3. To assist students in developing and broadening their critical and aesthetic criteria.
- 4. To broaden the students' awareness, understanding and aesthetic appreciation of art.
- 5. To assist students in identifying their own values in relationship to their environment.
- 6. To develop basic skills and techniques.

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Analyze works of art using the principles of visual language, which include the basic elements of design: point, form, line, shape, value, texture, color, space, and the principles of organization: rhythm, balance, scale/proportion and movement.
- 2. Build and construct both two- and three-dimensional artworks using the principles of visual language.
- 3. Think critically in order to create dynamic compositions and content-rich artwork.
- 4. Begin to explore seeing/identifying, imagining and problem solving with emphasis on both individual and collective creative approaches, thus contributing to their understanding and appreciation of the relationship between art and other disciplines.
- 5. Demonstrate the self-discipline required to make art in a professional manner.

EVALUATIONS:

Criteria for Evaluation

- 1. The level of creativity and craftsmanship demonstrated.
- 2. The degree of knowledge and understanding of the elements and principles of this particular studio discipline.
- 3. Portfolio presentations will be required throughout the duration of this course. (Do not throw away any of your work!)
- 4. Participation grade is established by your level of enthusiasm, commitment, involvement and flexibility in both studio and individual/collective critiques. It is also determined by your attending of all classes.

In-Class and Homework Assignments: 90%

There will be between 10 and 15 major assignments due throughout the semester. On the due date of each project, students will set up and present their artwork in an in-class, group critique, where it will be discussed and analyzed. Grades will be posted on Moodle after every assignment.

After the deadline, late assignments will lose 5% per day.

There are no mid-term or final exams in this class.

Attendance and Participation: 10%

Participation includes actively engaging in group critiques, discussions of assigned readings, etc. Poor attendance will drastically reduce your grade. Extreme lateness counts as an absence.

ATTENDANCE / PARTICIPATION:

- Attendance is mandatory. (Department Guidelines)
- Excessive lateness is equivalent to being absent from class. It is also disruptive to
 other students, and decreases your own effective learning or work time. Lectures are
 at the beginning of class, and will not be repeated for latecomers.
- More than 20% absenteeism may constitute a failure except for medical or extenuating circumstances, in which case a doctor's letter may be required.
- Participation includes contributing to in-class discussions and asking questions relevant to the topic being presented.
