CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:

A studio-based course with emphasis on the understanding of two and three dimensional design dynamics of visual form. A basic course where you will be introduced to various concepts and projects using a variety of art media. The second part of the course will build upon the knowledge of Part I and study colour theory.

PREREQUISITE(S)/COREQUISITE: AR1360

REQUIRED TEXT/RESOURCE MATERIALS: no text. Students will be supplied a list of materials as required

DELIVERY MODE(S): lecture/lab

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

- 1. Teach the students to perceive, identify and apply the basics of elements of art, principles of design and the creative process. They will begin to communicate visually expressed information while understanding abstract and pictorial relationships.
- 2. To equip students with a visual and verbal vocabulary.
- 3. Assist students in developing and broadening their critical and aesthetic criteria.
- 4. Broaden the students' awareness, understanding and aesthetic appreciation of art.
- 5. Assist students in identifying their own values in relationship to their environment.
- 6. Develop basic skills and techniques.

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

1. To further broaden the students working ability using the principles of visual language, which include the basic elements of design: form, line, shape, value, texture, colour, space and the principles of organization: rhythm, balance, scale/proportion and

movement.

- 2. The student will develop further the exploratory and critical thinking skills required in the production of a dynamic composition.
- 3. The student will continue to explore seeing/identifying, imagining and problem solving with emphasis on both individual and collective creative approaches, thus, contributing to their understanding and appreciation of the relationship between art and other disciplines
- 4. The student will build on the ability to demonstrate the self-discipline required to make art in a professional manner.
- 5. The student will be able to build and construct both two and three-dimensional artwork.

- 1. The level of creativity and craftsmanship demonstrated.
- 2. The degree of knowledge and understanding of the elements and principles of this particular studio discipline.
- 3. Portfolio presentations will be required throughout the duration of this course.
- 4. Participation grade is established by your level of enthusiasm, commitment, involvement and flexibility in both studio and individual/collective critiques. It is also determined by your attendance of all of the classes.

Mid-Term Grading:

Mid-term grading is by portfolio. It constitutes **40%** of the final grade. The portfolio will contain all of the in-class and home assignments from the first half of the term. Overdue portfolios will be penalized a minimum of 1 grade point per late day.

End-Term Grading:

End-term grading is by portfolio. It constitutes **40%** of the final grade. The portfolio will contain all of the in-class and home assignments from the second half of the term. Overdue portfolios will be penalized a minimum of 1 grade point per late day.

10% of the final grade will be determined by attending and recording the Visitor in the arts program

10% of the final grade will be determined by Participation
