CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:

AR1370, Visual Fundamentals 11 A studio-based course with emphasis on the understanding of two and three dimensional design dynamics of visual form. A basic course where you will be introduced to various concepts and projects using a variety of art media. The second part of the course will build upon the knowledge of Part I and study color theory.

CREDIT/CONTACT HOURS: 90 hours 3 (3-0-3)

DELIVERY MODE(S): lecture /lab

OBJECTIVES:

AR1370 will further the student's understanding of the elements of design such as form, line, shape, value, texture, colour, and space, and the principles of organization: rhythm, balance, scale/proportion and movement. There is an emphasis on exploration and production of concepts and the identification of the interrelation between concept and form. Students will explore a variety of both two and three dimensional media, gaining technical skills while developing a critical awareness of contemporary art.

During this course the student will:

- 1. Identify and apply the principles of aesthetic unity (balance, rhythm, repetition, dominance and contrast/variety) to the organization of the elements of visual art.
- 2. Develop a basic working knowledge of the techniques and materials introduced, especially those relating to drawing, painting, and sculpture.
- 3.Develop a critical understanding of two and three-dimensional art through discussion and class critiques, and begin to equip themselves with a visual and verbal vocabulary.
- 4. Learn to think creatively, to problem solve and to experiment.
- 5. Demonstrate the ability to independently research artists, techniques or media related to the course content, to record this research in a journal, and present findings to peers.
