COURSE OBJECTIVES:

- 1. Engage in production and process to deepen knowledge of drawing as a practice.
- 2. Develop the ability to be self-critical and to develop decision-making skills.
- 3. Broaden familiarity and basic skills with materials and techniques.
- 4. Develop introductory knowledge related to drawing the portrait and figure in monochromatic media.
- 5. Identify and apply the principles of aesthetic unity (balance, rhythm, repetition, dominance and contrast/variety) to the organization of the elements of visual art
- 6. Broaden knowledge of both historical and contemporary drawing practices.

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

- 1. Possess a basic working knowledge of the fundamental techniques and materials of drawing materials: pencil, ink, brush, ink wash, conte and charcoal.
- 2. Learn how to execute a portrait in monochromatic media.
- 3. Develop the basic skills to render and record the human form.
- 4. Learn the basics of composition as related to drawing.

EVALUATIONS:

There are no examinations.

a. Lab work is graded on an ongoing basis. Lab work reflects the daily class activity for that day. Hence, they will be due at the end of the class for marking. Lab work may also include preparation for the next class. These day-to-day marks are average, the percentage is weighted to reflect the amount of class time ranging from 20-25 percent. There will be no extensions for missed Lab work for any reason.

b. Series of small portfolios, 4 to 6 will be required through out the course.

They will cover 2 to 3 assignments or an area of study rather than a half term of assignments.

Following an assignment's last class, no further class time can be devoted. The portfolio will be due 1 to 2 weeks later. This will give you enough time to improve and complete the work if needed. You are encouraged to get feed back during class time once the assignment for that day has started. If you choose to work on an assignment that has already closed rather the assignment of the day you will be counted as absent.

Portfolios will always be due on a Friday by 4:00 pm in Studio A.

Failure to submit portfolio by the due dates will affect student's final evaluation.

Late portfolio will lose 10% per day. This includes weekends. If late, place it on the table in the foyer of Studio A and email me. I will pick it up.

c. The Mid-Term grade indicator is based only on assignments completed to date.

The Mid-Term is an indicator grade only for your reference.

AR2430 Drawing is a continuation of the introductory level studio AR2410. It is designed to continue the development of basic perceptual and recording skills primarily through the use of monochromatic media. The course will expand on the basic principles and techniques of drawing. This is a studio-based course involving mainly still life, portrait, the human figure and abstract / expressive.

The instructor directs course projects and/or assignments. Following an assignment's deadline, no further class time can be devoted, although students are encouraged to improve their work based on insights and comments expressed during class discussions and critiques. Students are expected to work outside of class time approximately 4 hours per week.

Content may not be covered in the sequence as listed below.

The instructor will determine assignments. Projects will be assigned for homework and handed in on the expected on the due date. Failure to finish projects on time for class critiques will affect student's final evaluation.

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES:

- You will have an ample amount of time to finish assignments for a portfolio that is your homework. You will have at least 1 to 2 weeks after the last class to finish and hone the assignments before the portfolio is due.

- I will not be asking you for late portfolios!

- **Be punctual!** I will not be delivering one to one classes or lectures. You are fully responsible for the material covered in class, projects and due dates.

- Late portfolios must be handed to in person. Or placed on the table in the foyer of Studio A, Email me if you placed your work on the foyer table.
