CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:

This course provides exposure to the techniques, theories, and practices of video production. It is designed to improve and nurture students' creative potential through the video media. Students will learn how to direct with a camera, work with actors, story boarding, lighting, sound, and the production of a student video project.

CREDIT/CONTACT HOURS: 3.00 Credits/15 Weeks, 45 Hours

DELIVERY MODE(S): Lectures, Screenings, Lab/Stage Work

OBJECTIVES:

- Introduce the basics of visual storytelling.
- Explore the fundamentals of pre-production, production, and post-production.

- Learn equipment and software common to video production and practice their techniques on the stage and in the lab.
- Develop, produce, and create three short visual projects.
- Participate in self-critiques and critiques of other students' work.

LEARNING OUTCOME:

At the end of the course, students can expect to:

- Critically assess films and discuss their strengths and weaknesses.
- Create a story using 3-act structure
- Write, plan, shoot, edit, and deliver a short, non-dialogue film.
- Navigate Final Cut Pro X and construct an edit from visual assets.

TRANSFERABILITY: Currently not eligible for University Transfer credit.
