PREREQUISITE(S)/COREQUISITE: EN0120 or equivalent, or equivalent English placement test score.

REQUIRED TEXTS/MATERIALS:

Gladwell, Malcolm – *Blink: The Power of Thinking Without Thinking* Ferguson, Will- *419* Shakespeare, William – *Othello* Duotang Binder Dividers Loose leaf Highlighters- at least two different colors.

I will also post reading material to the Moodle page for this course. In fact, *most* of the assigned readings for this semester will be available on Moodle. As such, it is *your* responsibility to check Moodle regularly to keep up with the assigned readings.

CALENDAR DESCRIPTION: This course includes a study of the five basic forms in literature: essays, short stories, novels, drama and poetry. Both oral presentations and written compositions are required - mainly personal responses, essays and one major research paper.

CREDIT/CONTACT HOURS: 6 hours/week

DELIVERY MODE(S): This course will be delivered through lectures, in-class group discussions and written responses, and oral presentations. The course is designed to allow students to develop and to utilize academic communication skills.

COURSE OBJECTIVES: The aims of this course are to provide students with the skills and tools necessary to think critically about a range of literary texts and to communicate ideas in a clear, coherent, and persuasive manner. Students will have the chance, individually and in groups, to consider, analyze, and discuss different kinds of writing; in so doing, students will have opportunities to improve oral and written communication skills.

LEARNING OUTCOMES: As a result of taking this course, students will gain the ability to:

- improve elements of grammar, punctuation, and sentence structure
- develop appropriate strategies for reading and responding to difficult materials
- practice and improve critical thinking skills
- format an essay correctly
- develop an understanding of essay components such as thesis statements and topic sentences
- research effectively
- make valuable use of secondary research materials by learning how to summarize and incorporate others' words and ideas into one's own writing
- plan an essay, moving from outlining, to writing a first draft, to revising and editing
- analyse aspects of plot, setting, characterization, tone, and theme in short stories, novels, drama, and poetry
- discuss a writer's point of view and how it relates to a work's larger themes
- identify and analyse important details in a given text
- identify devices of figurative language such as metaphor, irony, allusion
- identify musical elements such as rhyme, rhythm and alliteration

COURSE SCHEDULE/TENTATIVE TIMELINE:

Weeks 1-4: Prose Non-Fiction: Malcolm Gladwell's Blink and Essays

Week 5-8: Prose Fiction: Short Stories and Will Ferguson's 419

Weeks 9-12: **Poetry & Drama**: Shakespeare's *Othello* and an exploration of poetry and literary devices.

Weeks13-14: The Research Essay

Week 15: Final Review

EVALUATIONS:

Participation (includes in-class participation, oral presentations, literature circles and other group work) – 10% Article of the Week and other in-class assignments – 10% Essays-20% Tests/Exams – 20% Research essay – 10% Final exam – 30%

All in-class essays as well as tests and exams MUST be written at the scheduled times unless PRIOR arrangements have been made with the instructor. A missed in-class essay or test (exam) will result in a score of ZERO on that test (exam). Only in very specific cases may student be given an opportunity to make up a missed exam (student will be presented with a different version of the exam). Doctor, lawyer or police documentation may be required. The final exam is 3 hours long and is scheduled by the registrars' office during GPRC Exam weeks. Do not book vacation in this time period.

TRANSFERABILITY: ** Grade of D or D+ may not be acceptable for transfer to other postsecondary institutions. Students are cautioned that it is their responsibility to contact the receiving institutions to ensure transferability

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES:

1. **Good attendance** is a requirement of this course and of academic success generally. A student's failure to attend **fifteen percent of classes** (10 lecture classes) means that he or she will receive a **failing** grade for participation and may be disbarred upon the instructor's discretion from writing the final exam.

2. Good attendance means more than simply being present physically during class

time. It means coming to class prepared, having read the assigned material(s) for the day, and showing respect to all the other members of the class by being attentive. Disruptive activities – for instance, habitually arriving late or leaving early, will not be tolerated.

3. **Cell phones are to be turned off and kept out of sight at all times**. Failure to comply with this rule will result in a reduced participation grade.

4. All formal assignments are to be submitted as hard copies. This means that I will not accept electronic submissions of formal assignments.

5. All assignments are to be submitted by the assigned date and at the beginning of class time. Late assignments will be penalized 20% per day, with weekends counting as one day. After three days, I will no longer accept the assignment. I will grant extensions for assignments in extenuating circumstances *only*. Last-minute requests for extensions will not be granted unless medical or other formal documentation can be provided. Please note that I will not accept any unsubmitted assignments after I have handed back marked assignments to the class. (Turnaround time for marked assignments is usually about one week).

6. Students should avoid making travel plans until after the exam schedule has been set. The registrar will release the exam schedule during the semester; please note that absolutely **no** alternative examination dates will be considered except in the case of a medical emergency.

7. **Students are required to check the Moodle site for this course regularly**. Students should check it before each class to stay informed concerning course updates, readings, and announcements.
