CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:

This course involves studies in literatures in English from around the world. Instruction will include essay writing skills.

DELIVERY MODE(S): The course work includes lecture, class discussion, in-class quizzes, writing instruction, and assignments.

COURSE OBJECTIVES: This course offers a survey of twentieth- and twenty-first century writings from around the world. Its aim is not to discuss contemporary global literatures in their totality; rather, this course is designed to allow us to gain a sense of the richness and variety of international writing. At the same time, we will also come to appreciate literature's ability to make connections across geographical, cultural, and historical distances.

LEARNING OUTCOMES: After taking this course, the successfully participating students will demonstrate the following:

- Knowledge of, and the ability to use, a critical vocabulary suited to the discussion of literature
- An understanding of the interrelation of text and context in the production and consumption of literary texts
- Skills crucial to effective college-level essay composition, from planning, to writing, to revision
- The ability to perform secondary research as well as the ability to use research effectively and responsibly in writing assignments

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES:

2. Written assignments are to be submitted *on time*. This means that they are due *before the beginning of class*. Late assignments will incur a penalty of 5% per day, with weekends counting as one day.
3. Extensions will not be granted for written assignments except in extenuating circumstances. Documentation will be required.
4. Students are expected to attend *all* classes. Unexcused absences will negatively affect the participation component of a student’s grade and could result in a failing grade for that component of a student’s final mark.
5. Students are required to check the Moodle site for this course before each class to stay informed concerning the schedule of readings as well as course updates and announcements.
6. Cellphones are to be turned off and kept out of sight during class time. Students who text while the instructor and/or other students are speaking will lose marks for participation. Similarly, students must display good classroom etiquette at all times. This includes coming to class on time, not packing up to leave before the instructor has indicated that class is over, and not engaging in discussions with

others while the instructor or other students are speaking. The unwillingness to abide by these expectations will result in a student receiving a failing grade for participation.

7. The midterm test for this class will take place on **Wednesday, October 25th**. The midterm **will not** be rescheduled except in extenuating circumstances. Documentation will be required for any student wishing to write the midterm on an alternate date.

8. The final exam for this class will be scheduled by the registrar and will take place in December. The exam **will not** be rescheduled except in extenuating circumstances. Documentation will be required for any student wishing to write the final exam on an alternate date.
