CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:

This first-year university course combines spoken and written French, and includes listening, comprehension, pronunciation, grammar, composition, and literature.

PREREQUISITE(S)/COREQUISITE: French 30 or equivalent

****Please note: Francophone and immersion students should enrol in FR 2210/FR2240.**

REQUIRED TEXTS:

1. Champeny, Séverine, *Imaginez: le français sans frontières*, 3rd edition, cours de français intermédiaire, Vista Higher Learning, 2016 (Leçons 1-5 will be covered and the same book is used in FR2120). The textbook is accompanied by a Supersite code which will give you access to the online activities and resources at www.vhlcentral.com.
2. Recommended: a good French/English dictionary or online dictionary: WordReference.com
3. Supplementary materials may be used for extra practice.

DELIVERY MODE(S):

The course is based on Leçons 1-5 of *Imaginez*. The textbook presents practical vocabulary related to the lesson theme, authentic short films by award-winning francophone filmmakers, cultural readings and video clips of the francophone world, structures and *Fiches de grammaire*, and authentic literary selections by writers from diverse francophone countries. Most of our in-class time will focus on this material. Beside the textbook, the *Imaginez* Supersite provides you with many additional activities and a complete Lab Program. In addition, the ‘Supersite Plus’ offers you the WebSAM: the online Student Activities Manual is to be completed for the most part on your own and will give you supplemental practice using language elements introduced from the textbook in class.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

The aim of this course is to enable students to communicate in oral and written French in most informal and some formal situations on topics of personal and general interest with suitable

accuracy and confidence. Students will review and expand their grammatical and lexical knowledge in a Francophone cultural context.

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

After successfully completing this course, the students will be able to:

- master a wide range of practical vocabulary related to the lesson themes of the textbook;
- communicate comfortably and with confidence in most formal and informal real-life situations;
- read and understand short literary and cultural readings (literary extracts, poems, cultural texts);
- write compositions using various grammatical structures (affirmative, negative, interrogative, and imperative forms), and tenses (présent, passé composé, imparfait, and plus-que-parfait);
- understand listening exercises, short-subject dramatic films and authentic video clips from the francophone world;
- speak, engage in conversation, and interact with others using different grammatical structures, a wide range of vocabulary, and present and past tenses;
- appreciate and celebrate the French culture in a diverse French-speaking world (la francophonie aux États-Unis, le Québec, la France, les Antilles et l’Afrique de l’Ouest);
- virtually meet famous francophone people such as painters, writers, poets, filmmakers, singers, musicians, designers, and photographers)
- use the computer and complete the online WebSAM activities.

1. **Chapter Tests** – There are 4 chapter tests. Upon completion of each test, students will gain feedback on their progress through a written chapter test. Chapter tests **cannot be made up**, but in the case of a medical emergency with an official doctor's note, may be excused.
2. **Compositions / Rédactions** – There are 5 compositions. The topics will be distributed in class and should be enriched with vocabulary and grammar learned within each “Leçon”. Keep a copy of all written work. In the event of loss or theft, the student will be required to submit a duplicate copy.
3. **Quizzes / Devoirs** – There are 5 short written quizzes or assignments to check your knowledge of vocabulary and/or grammar presented in the “Leçons”. Expect approximately one per chapter.
4. **Workbook online / Cahier d'exercices** – Language acquisition depends on contact with and repeated use of concepts taught in class. The Workbook Manual is accessible online and is to be completed and submitted for grading online outside of class time. The online Supersite provides many additional activities to support you with many possible opportunities to hear, speak, and read French. **Workbooks are graded online.**
5. **Attendance, Participation, and French Club Cultural Activities** – Your attendance, punctuality, participation, and contribution to creating a positive interactive learning environment will affect your learning and contribute to your grades. Participation and attendance are worth **10%**. Students earn **8%** of this percentage through regular attendance, class participation, and contribution to a positive interactive learning environment. The remaining **2%** of the attendance/participation mark is earned by attending at least 2 GPRC French Club cultural activities (French movie nights, the French Tutor Centre, crêpes, games, and other cultural events). The French Club cultural activities schedule will be communicated to you early in the term.

6. **Final Exam** (oral production & written and oral comprehension) – A final comprehensive written Exam consisting of written and listening (oral comprehension) parts will be scheduled by the Registrar. The Oral production exam will take place with a partner during the last week of classes.
