CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:

Survey of development of economic, political and social aspects of the French and British periods to 1867 is included in the course. The course gives an understanding and appreciation of Canadian heritage, and provides foundation for advanced study in history and related studies.

CREDIT/CONTACT HOURS:

HI 2600 consists of three hours of lecture and discussion each week.

The course work includes lectures, discussions, research and writing assignments as well as a midterm and final exam.

The primary objectives of HI2600 are:

- To present students with an overview of the forces that shaped Canada up to Confederation.
- To develop and enhance historical research and synthesis skills as well as composition skills.

All assignments must by word-processed. It is particularly important to save a copy of any written work handed in for credit or grading.

All assignments will be submitted electronically via Moodle. This procedure will be demonstrated in class.

All assignments are to be submitted before midnight on the due date. Students will have a three calendar day grace period to submit work after the due date. Work submitted after the three day grace period but before ten days after the due date will be penalized 25%. Work submitted more than ten days after the grace period will not be accepted for grading and students will receive a 0% for the assignment. Extensions beyond the grace period will only be considered when students contact the instructor <u>prior</u> to the deadline and present evidence of extenuating circumstances.

Students will be assessed on their research, synthesis and writing in the course assignments. The presentation of information in terms of organization and writing will be given equal weight in grading to the research and analysis.

There will be a midterm exam scheduled during class in October and a final exam written during the exam period in December.

- Students are expected to commit the required time to complete this course. Requests to reschedule assignments or exams are extraordinary and will only be granted under such circumstances.
