CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:

NS1240 Foundations of Nursing 1

★3 (fi 6) (first term, 3-0-0). The course explores the meanings of health and healing. It highlights the diversity of beliefs, values, and perceptions of health. The course introduces the Canadian Health Care System, conceptual frameworks of health promotion, determinants of health, disease and injury prevention, and primary health care. The focus is on the nurse/client relationship in a relational practice context.

ASSIGNMENT DESCRIPTIONS:

1) Group reflection assignment: Thursdays in the Discussion Forum by 1600 hrs.

The group reflection assignment provides students with opportunities to develop reflection skills, teamwork, and leadership skills.

Students will participate in small group discussion in each seminar. At the end of each week an “in reflection” question will be posted to facilitate group reflection and discussion.

Every student will be assigned as group leader twice during the semester. As group leader your responsibility is to summarize the groups discussion into **two paragraphs and post it on Moodle in the Discussion Forum by four p.m. Thursday**, the week in which you are leader.

2) Writing assignment: Due date: March 20, 2020.

Purpose: This assignment calls on students to examine the Canadian Association of School Nursing (CASN)’s entry to practice gerontological competencies. This assignment will build on your ability to learn through writing.

A. Writing Process:

- a. Students be given two indicators from the competencies in CASN’s entry to practice gerontological competencies.
- b. Using peer reviewed articles students will write a four-page paper discussing challenges to older people related to their chosen indicators and how nurses can meet the indicators. The title page and reference page are not included in the page limit. Peer reviewed articles should be within the last five years.

B. Writing requirements:

- **APA 6th** edition throughout the document
- **Title Page:** Note: Please use your name.
- **Abstract and Author's note: None required for this assignment**
- **Introduction**
 - Background related to the topic to provide a context for the reader
 - Statement of aim/purpose of paper and how paper will unfold
 - Thesis statement
- **Body of Paper**
 - The main body of your paper should include discussion related to the competency and indicators you have chosen. General statements are supported with specific details **from scholarly sources** that further your point. Paragraphs are crafted to support and **extend your own ideas**.
 - Use professional literature to explore and support your ideas.
- **Conclusion**
 - Bring together what you have discussed as it relates to your thesis statement.
 - Summarize key points and provide a concluding statement
- **References**
 - Complete list of references for each source cited in your paper in APA style.

3) Midterm exam: February 24th, 2020

Multiple choice exam assessing concepts in the first six weeks of the course. The midterm exam will be completed within a scheduled class time.

4) Final exam: During Final Exam Week – TBA

Multiple choice exam assessing concepts from the entire course. Date, time, and location of the final examination is scheduled by the Office of the Registrar in accordance with Grande Prairie Regional College Calendar and will be available on MyGPRC.

Deferred final examinations may be granted when an examination has been missed or interrupted because of illness, or a conflict with religious beliefs. In the case of illness (physical, mental or emotional), medical documentation will normally be required. See page 42 of the 2019/2020 GPRC calendar for further information.

5) Medical Terminology – Online

This online program must be purchased from the GPRC bookstore as you will require an access code for the online program. There is no textbook for this course. This course is designed to work at your own speed, however there are quizzes at scheduled times which you must complete at the specified time. The quizzes are to help you be successful in the Final Exam which is scheduled for the end of the term.
