#### **Course Description:**

Introductory Cree II is a general introduction to Plains Cree (Y dialect) grammar, and vocabulary with an emphasis in the practise in speaking and working in the language laboratory.

#### **Course Objectives:**

Students will be able to comprehend simple sentences written in Roman Orthography, through their knowledge of vocabulary, word agreement, word order and association. This course will give students a basic understanding of the "Y" dialect with a limited vocabulary, but students will not yet be expected to be able to form sentences and speak fluently. This course will provide preparation for the intermediate Cree NS153.
