CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:

Introductory Cree I is a general introduction to Plains Cree (Y dialect) grammar, and vocabulary with an emphasis in the practice in speaking and writing in Cree Syllabics and Roman Orthography. No prior knowledge of Cree is assumed.

CREDIT/CONTACT HOURS: 3 credits / 5 hours per week

DELIVERY MODE(S): Lectures, Labs, Discussions, & Audio/Video Conference

OBJECTIVES: This Course introduces students to:

• Students will be able to comprehend simple sentences written in Roman Orthography, through their knowledge of vocabulary, word agreement, word order and association.

Students will also be able to interpret and write in Cree Syllabics. Individual projects will be done both in written and presented orally in class. There will be in class and some take home assignments throughout this term. Often the structure is provided for you through class lectures. Attendance and participation are very important in this course. Students will not be allowed to reschedule missed quizzes or assignments unless they provide a valid reason. This course will provide preparation for the intermediate Cree NT1522

LEARNING OUTCOMES: As a result of taking this course, students will gain the abilities to:

- demonstrate and understand simple sentences written in Roman Orthography, and Cree Syllabics through their knowledge gained of the vocabulary, word agreement word order and association.
- recognize words written in Roman Orthography.
- identify and incorporate Cree words into simple sentences by translating them into English.
- demonstrate basic level understanding of the Cree language
- apply and evaluate their knowledge of basic terms written and spoken in Cree.

PROJECTS:

Students will complete two projects:

- 1. a) A lesson plan written in Roman Orthography and Cree Syllabics, which must be presented in class referencing a particular unit (any structural aspect of the language) of the Cree Curriculum.
- b) An in class presentation for teaching the above unit written in Cree. Presentation must contain a method for evaluating students;
- 2. Project on topic of interest in language or culture; any structural aspect of the language or culture.

LANGUAGE LABORATORY:

Language lab tapes are available for student use. Attendance is critical and is included as a portion of your lab grade.

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES:

The assigned readings and exercises for each class should be completed before attending that class, except for the first class. As this course will depend heavily practice exercises, attendance at all sessions is required and is critical to the student's success in the course.
