# Sociology 2710 [A4] THE FAMILY

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Spring Semester [May 4 – 28] 2009 Grande Prairie Regional College Monday *thru* Thursday, 13:00-15:50 hrs.

This course introduces students to the study of the sociology of family relationships. The course begins with an overview of marriage and family structures and a review of family theoretical frameworks and research techniques. The formation of intimate relationships, the development of marital roles and the transition to parenthood, gender roles, division of labor, and socialization are examined next. In the final part of the course we will look at families under stress; this includes the study of marital tensions and divorce – as well as remarriage, transitions and family/relationship innovations in the context of technological change.
