REQUIRED TEXT(S)/RESOURCE MATERIALS: Susan McDaniel and Lorne Tepperman, 2015 (5th edition), <u>Close Relations: An Introduction to the Sociology of Families</u>. Pearson/Prentice-Hall: Toronto.

CALENDAR DESCRIPTION: The structure and function of the family system, historically and cross-culturally will be explored in this course. The family system in contemporary societies emphasizing its institutional characteristics and current trends will be a focus.

CREDIT/CONTACT HOURS: 3 (3-0-0) UT 45 hours

DELIVERY MODE(S): lectures, class discussion, group work, class presentations, written tests, written projects

COURSE OBJECTIVES: Students will be taught: the history of contemporary Western family forms and processes; theories/research approaches to the study of the relationship formation and dynamics, family/married life, families/marriages in the context of work, the economy, and contemporary family-oriented policies; the sociolegal aspects of family/marriage responsibilities, child-bearing and parenting,

separation and divorce; the challenges of family/marriage/parenting in a diverse and multicultural society like Canada.

LEARNING OUTCOMES: Students will: gain insights into the formation/maintenance of intimate relationships in their own lives; learn how they are socialized into marital roles; how they can successfully transition to parenthood; approach family and relationship responsibilities in fair and equitable ways; understand how relationships and families are impacted by social pressures and stress and how conflict can be resolved; be able to make informed personal decisions regarding modern innovations in family structure in the context of social-technological change.

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES:

The *Mid-Term Exam* will consist of multiple choice and short-answer questions (20%). The *Final Exam* will be in two parts – (1) an exam scheduled during the final exam period (date TBA), and (2) a take-home portion given a week <u>in advance</u> of the last day of classes <u>and due on that day</u> (April 14), for a combined (1)+(2) value of 30%.

ATTENDANCE AND EXAM POLICIES:

Attendance at lectures is strongly encouraged, as is your participation in class discussions. In addition –

- 1. More than <u>3</u> absences (without medical proof or other *legitimate* documentation, etc.) could result in being barred from writing the final exam
- 2. All exams, averaged (where applicable), must have a passing mark to obtain a passing grade in the course; otherwise, the final mark shall be 'F'

Late assignments (or any assignment/course components) will result in a deduction of 5% PER DAY, up to and including the day of a late submission, <u>unless</u> immediate or prior arrangements, based on extenuating circumstances, have been made. Documented personal or family emergencies, of course, will be accommodated. <u>Example</u>: if an assignment is worth 20%, one day late makes it 15%, etc.

You will be provided with instructions and relevant information on Moodle with plenty of lead time in regards to the Vanier Institute Report presentations, the projects (analysis of dating sites like eHarmony)/social network sites (like Facebook); how to do a proper Family Genogram, or Family Developmental History), etc.

♥ For some of the semester course work (except exams), students may choose to work with a partner (both students will share the mark for their work), or you may work individually. <u>However</u>, the daily Vanier Institute presentations will be done by a group of 2 students.


