CALENDAR DESCRIPTION: A studio and lecture-based course with emphasis on the foundational principles and elements of 2D composition and design, including an introduction to colour theory. Students will be guided through the exploration of a variety of 2D mediums, materials, and processes, including safe handling protocols.

PREREQUISITE(S)/COREQUISITE: None

REQUIRED TEXT/RESOURCE MATERIALS: No textbook is required. Material lists will be provided and discussed in class.

DELIVERY MODE(S): Lecture and lab

LEARNING OUTCOMES: By the end of this course students will be able to:

- Demonstrate the ability to identify and apply the basic elements of 2D design, which include line, shape, value, texture, colour, and space.
- Identify and apply the principles of design, which include emphasis, repetition, movement, contrast, rhythm, pattern, variety, unity, proportion, and balance.
- Apply basic colour theory to their work.
- Demonstrate basic skills in using a variety of 2D art materials and mediums.

- Demonstrate the self-discipline required to make art in a professional manner, through the careful and timely completion of assigned projects.
- Think creatively and apply problem-solving skills using the elements and principles of design.
- Maintain health and safety protocols while handling 2D materials.
- Demonstrate an understanding of the importance of community in the field of visual arts by contributing constructively to group critiques and discussions.

EVALUATIONS: Will be based on:

1. The level of creativity and craftsmanship demonstrated in all major and minor assignments.
2. The degree of knowledge and understanding of the elements and principles.
3. Participation grade is established by your level of enthusiasm, commitment, involvement and flexibility in both studio work and individual/collective critiques.

Detailed guidelines for each project with mark breakdowns and evaluation criteria will be reviewed during class.

In-Class and Homework Assignments: 85%

- There will be 4-6 major assignments as well as 3-5 minor assignments.
- On the due date of each major project, students will present their artwork for in-class critique.
- Feedback will be posted on MyClass, along with a grade.
- Late assignments will lose 5% per day to a maximum of 15% (or three days).
- There are no mid-term or final exams in this class.

Attendance and Participation: 15%

Participation grades are based on the following: arriving on time, listening to lectures and instruction, being prepared, and working during class time, sharing ideas, concepts, creative exploration, and conceptual development with other students, cooperating in group projects, analyzing, and offering opinions about work in progress, listening to and being an active participant in critique and discussions.

- Attendance at the Visitor in the Arts speaker series is mandatory and contributes to your grade.
