#### CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:

This is the first of a two part, in-depth course examining the concepts of cost and managerial accounting. Major topics include the following: cost-volume profit-analysis, relevant costs and short-term decision making, responsibility accounting, standard costing and variance analysis, and product costing and cost flow.

- Understand and utilize master budgets and flexible budgets
- Calculate and explain variances and their uses in management of organizations
- Understand and explain the effects of variable and absorption costing and related inventory valuations and income effects
- Determine cost drivers and how costs behave
- Utilize all previous information to determine relevant costs and resultant management decision making.

### **In-Class Assessments:**

In-class assessments will be administered throughout the semester to promote active learning. You must be in class to participate. Absences during an in-class assessment will be assigned a grade of zero.

### **Quizzes:**

Quizzes will be conducted as the course progresses. Students will be given advanced notice of quiz dates. Absences during a quiz will be assigned a grade of zero. For excused absences, the quiz weighting may be transferred to the term test. Students with 6 or more absences will be refused permission to transfer any test weightings.

### **Term Tests:**

Term tests will be scheduled in advance and written in class. Absences during a test will be assigned a grade of zero. In extenuating circumstances, test weightings may be transferred to the final exam when calculating the final grade at the instructor's discretion. However, the letter grade before writing the final exam will include the zero grade and remain unchanged. Students with 6 or more absences will be refused permission to transfer any test weightings.

### **Final Exam:**

The two-hour final exam will be written as scheduled by the Registrar's Office during the exam period from December 12 – 19. Do not plan activities or trips during this time. Unexcused absences will be assigned a grade of zero. Students are expected to arrive on time and stay for the first half hour. Students who arrive after the first student has left the examination room will not be allowed to write the final exam and will be assigned a grade of zero. Students who submit a blank or substantially incomplete exam will not be eligible for a repeat final examination.
