CALENDAR DESCRIPTION: A studio and lecture-based course with emphasis on the foundational principles and elements of 2D composition and design, including an introduction to colour theory. Students will be guided through the exploration of a variety of 2D mediums, materials, and processes, including safe handling protocols.

REQUIRED MATERIALS: A detailed material list will be provided and discussed in class.

LEARNING OUTCOMES: Upon completion of the course, students should be able to:

- Identify and apply the basic elements of 2D design: line, shape, value, texture, colour, and composition.
- Identify and apply the principles of design: emphasis, repetition, movement, contrast, rhythm, pattern, variety, unity, proportion, and balance.
- Apply foundational colour theory in their work.
- Demonstrate basic skills using a range of 2D art materials and media.
- Show focus, discipline, and professionalism by completing projects on time.
- Think creatively and use problem-solving strategies grounded in design elements and principles.
- Follow health and safety protocols when working with 2D materials.
- Contribute constructively to critiques and discussions, demonstrating an understanding of community in the visual arts.

Project 1: Basics of Line/Tone: Pencil and Pen: Emphasis/Tone/ Repetition/ Pattern (to create tone) 15%

Project 2: Comic: Pen and Ink: Tone/ Repetition/ Pattern/Shape/Composition 20%

Project 3: Lino Cut: Line/ Balance/ Movement/Texture 30% (supplies provided)

Project 4: Colour Wheel: Paint: Colour Sensitivity and its Importance 35%

GRADING CRITERIA: Will be based on:

1. The level of creativity and craftsmanship demonstrated in all assignments, including sketches and research.
2. The degree of knowledge and understanding of the elements and principles.

3. Your level of enthusiasm, commitment, involvement and flexibility in both studio work and individual/collective critiques establishes your participation grade. Detailed guidelines, with mark breakdowns and evaluation criteria, will be reviewed during each project introduction.

Grading Overview

1. Attendance & Participation – 15%

- Arrive on time, be prepared, take notes, and work during class.
- Engage in lectures, discussions, critiques, and group projects.
- Share ideas, explore concepts, and contribute constructively to class activities.
- Attendance at the **Visitor in the Arts speaker series is strongly encouraged.**

2. Sketchbooks & Research – 15% (per assignment, if required)

- Maintain consistent, high-quality sketches, notes, and experimentation.
- Include visual and textual research: thumbnail sketches, preparatory drawings, material studies, readings, and notes.
- Show that final work is derived from sketchbook ideas.
- Demonstrate thoughtful selection of concepts and materials.
- Incorporate research to situate projects in historical and contemporary art contexts.
- Advance knowledge and practice through experimentation and reflection.

3. Assignments – 85%

- Complete 4 assignments (some with multiple sections).
 - Include sketches and research unless otherwise specified.
 - Present artwork and sketchbooks for **in-class critique**; setup must be done before class begins.
 - **Late submissions:** –5% per day, up to 15% maximum.
 - **No mid-term or final exams.**
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Please note that most institutions will not accept your course for transfer credit **IF** your grade is less than C-.
