COURSE DESCRIPTION

The incorporation of aboriginal peoples into Canada is one of the critical issues of our times. In this course, we will attempt to make sense of the Native point of view, its logic and rationale, and the conflict this has represented within Canadian society, past and present. Following an initial outline of the culture and society of abortginal peoples prior to European occupation, we shall study their experience under Euro-Canadian domination. Of particular interest is the perspective that legal systems are created to further particular economic and political interests, and within particular cultural frameworks; however, they can also be utilized by those whose interests are opposed and whose culture is different.

RECUIREMENTS AND EVALUATION

There will be a mid-term test and a final examination. Each will consist of essay questions, and will be based on all course materials: lectures, class discussions, readings and/or films. At least one week before each test/exam. students will be given a list of study questions from which test questions will be chosen.

The assignment will consist of an essay answer to a question based on Shkilnyk's A POISON STRONGER THAN LOVE. Finally, students will investigate one instance of the impostition of Canadian "rules", the effect this has had on Native society, and how Natives have endeavored to counteract this influence. This information will be presented in an essay of approximately fifteen pages in length.

Assignments must be handed in to the instructor in class on the day they are due. Unauthorized tardiness may result in the loss of 2 out of 9 points. Excessive grammatical or spelling errors may have the same result. Decisions regarding make-up tests will be at the instructor's

discretton.
