What: This is an introductory-level studio course that continues the
exploration of the basic concepts of sculpture begun in AR 1610.
It is a 3 credit course that, in conjunction with AR1610, is a
University Transfer Sculpture course. Various approaches and conceptual attitudes will be examined to broaden the student's appreciation of sculpture and visual culture.

 Late portfolios not excepted.

 Supplies: Supply lists vary from year to year and will be given on a project by project basis. Students should budget at least \$250,00 for supplies. (AT LEAST) Every effort will be made to use the cheapest available materials.



WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW.

Students upon completion of this course will:

- Exhibit a working knowledge of the fundamentals of sculpture including:
 - · The various characteristics of sculptural media.
 - The preparation of a variety of sculptural media (like clay, plaster, cement, wood, found material and others.)
 - Various ways of sculpting, advantages and disadvantages, both traditional and experimental focusing on additive and reductive methods.
- Identify and apply fundamental principles of composition as related to sculpture (harmony, balance, rhythm, repetition, dominance, variety) using the elements of visual art (line, shape, value, texture and colour.)
- Perceive visual relationships in the environment and record these perceptions
 as sculptures.
- 5. Develop confidence and competence in the verbal discussion of these topics.
- 6. Develop an awareness of visual culture as related to three dimensions.



COURSE OBJECTIVES

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READING AND/OR HOME ASSIGNMENTS:

- Students can expect to put in a minimum of:
 six (6) to twelve (12) hours per week on out-of-class work.
- Assignments are expected on the date required. Failure to complete projects on time for class critiques will effect the student's final evaluation.

ABSENTEEISM

More than 20% absenteeism from class will result in the student being asked to leave the class. Further, if students fail to complete and submit 85% of grade requirements of the term mark they will not be allowed to complete the course. In
