CALENDAR DESCRIPTION: An introductory level studio course designed to give you a foundation in drawing primarily through the use of monochromatic media. Emphasis will be placed on the principles and techniques of drawing while simultaneously exploring expressive uses of the medium. You may work from the still life figure and landscape situations, as well as experiment with a broad range of drawing media.

DELIVERY MODE(S): Lecture and Lab

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

1. Start to apply the formal elements of composition, line, space, tone, light, shadow and texture to drawing
2. Demonstrate observational skills in contour, gesture, and tonal drawing of still-life, figure and portrait.
3. Use a variety of media such as, charcoal, conté, graphite and ink wash.
4. Start to articulate ideas about their own work and the work of others through critical thinking, analysis, discussions and critiques.
5. Participate actively in critiques and feedback sessions.

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

1. Acquire perceptual drawing skills.
2. Develop an understanding of the basic elements of drawing: line shape, value and texture and colour.
3. Develop an understanding and apply the concepts of unity and composition. Develop an aesthetic appreciation of drawing.
4. Develop specific and techniques through a variety of media.
5. Acquire the confidence to apply these techniques to artistic expressions and ideas.

EVALUATIONS:

There are no examinations, assignment and lab work are graded on an on going bases, as per due dates. A small portfolio may be required mid and end term.

The Mid–Term grade indicator is **based only on assignments** completed to date. The Mid–Term is an **indicator grade only for your reference.**

In class, Lab work reflects the daily class activity for that day, they will be short. Hence, they will be due at the end of the class for marking. **There will be no extensions for Lab work for any reason.**

Failure to finish assignments on time for class critiques and due dates will affect student's final evaluation. Late work will lose 10% per day.

Attendance is mandatory. (Department Guidelines)

More than 20% absenteeism may constitute a failure except for medical or extenuating circumstances in which case a doctor's letter may be required.

After 20% absenteeism, you may be required to withdraw from the course.

Assignments	70-65%	Specific assignments are weighted. Assignments are the equivalent of an examine. Expect to have about seven assignments.
Lab	20- 25%	Lab work is graded on the in-class activities, these day-to-day marks are averaged, the percentage is weighted to reflect the amount of class time ranging from 20-25 percent. Lab work will also include preparation for the next class
Attendance / Participation	10%	This is a rather straightforward mathematical formula based on your attendance. If there are 25 classes in this course. Attend all classes arriving on time $25/25 = 100 = 10\%$ of the year.

Left Early (LE) If you leave class early, sign out with the departure time, the difference will be regarded & marked as if it were a late arrival time. **Please inform me at the start of class if you need to leave early. You are responsible for missed work and missed information.**

As an example:

Miss no classes, 25/25 = 100%, Receive A+

COURSE SCHEDULE/TENTATIVE TIMELINE:

AR2410 is a studio-based course intended to provide students with a broad range of experience and information relating to the exploration of monochromatic media in Drawing. **The main emphasis of the course is to explore means of representation based on observation, utilizing the basic elements of design, such as composition, placement, figure/ground relationships, line, tone,**

scale, texture. The subject will involve working predominately from still life, portraits, landscape and interior spaces and experimenting with a broad range of media. There may also be a couple of classes where the human figure will be introduced.

The instructor directs course projects and/or assignments. Following an assignment's deadline, no further class time can be devoted, although students are encouraged to improve their work based on insights and comments expressed during class discussions and critiques. Students are expected to work outside of class time approximately 4 hours per week.

Over View

Assignments will have specific criteria.

Topical Areas

- Line
- Accenting, linear weighting
- Balance, Positive and negative space
- Texture and pattern
- Tonal Development Pictorial Space, Overlapping/Depth, Modeling of a form
- Sensitivity to various media
- Hand / eye recording and measuring skills
- Perspective hand drawn
- Construction Drawing and Measurement
- Further attention to arrangement of the composition
- Experimentation

Content may not be covered in the sequence as listed below.

The instructor will determine assignments. Projects will be assigned for homework and handed in on the expected on the due date. Failure to finish projects on time for class critiques will affect student's final evaluation.

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES:

- **Respect and take pride and care of your work.** You will need examples for your **transfer portfolios** when applying to other institutions. ***Expect to have a portfolio of works when applying for transfer.***

- **Late assignments will lose 10% grade for each day late. (Includes week ends) After 10 days, you will receive a zero grade. It is your responsibility to get your work to me.**

- **I will not be asking you for late work!**

- **Late work must be handed to in person. Or placed on the table in the foyer of Studio A, Email me if you placed your work on the foyer table.**
