Course Description:

An introductory level studio course designed to develop basic perceptual and recording skills primarily through the use of monochromatic media. The course will cover the basic principles and techniques of drawing. Studio based course involving the use of landscape, still-life and will form a high percentage of the course. The human figure may be used during the last few classes.

Course Objectives:

- Perceive visual relationships in the environment and record these perceptions in terms of the elements art (line, shape, value and texture)
- Identify and apply the principles of aesthetic unity (balance, rhythm. repetition, dominance and contrast/variety) to the organization of the elements of visual art.
- Manipulate the elements of visual art on a two dimensional surface through using the principles of depth perception.
- Exhibit a basic working knowledge of the fundamental techniques and materials of drawing including the use of pencil, conte and charcoal.
