## Description:

This introductory level studio course is designed to give students a foundation to the basics of drawing. Emphasis will be placed on the principles and techniques of drawing while simultaneously exploring expressive uses of the drawing medium. Students will work from the still life, figure and landscape situations, as well as experiment with a broad range of drawing media.

# Objectives:

- 1. To acquire perceptual drawing skills.
- To develop an understanding of the basic elements of drawing: line, shape, value, texture and volume.
- To develop an understanding and apply concepts of unity in composition.
- To develop aesthetic appreciation of drawing.
- To develop specific skills and techniques through a variety of media.

## Homework:

Projects will be assigned for homework and expected on the date required. Failure to finish projects on time for class critiques will affect student's final evaluation. Students will be expected to spend at least six hours a week drawing out of class.

# Criteria for Assessment:

- The standard of work achieved.
- Creative and aesthetic quality of the work.
- The degree of knowledge and understanding of the elements and principles of this particular studio discipline as reflected in the submitted drawings.
- Progress achieved overall.
- Overdue assignments will be penalized. Work must be completed within seven days of original deadline or failure to do so may constitute a "0" grade.
- Professional Orientation as indicated by commitment, and involvement in collective and individual critiques, completion of assignments, meeting deadlines, time spent additional to class hours, and attitude

#### Facilities:

Students are responsible for clean-up of the studios and general maintenance. It must be clearly understood that studios must be let clean and clear after use. Good housekeeping is essential. Radios, cassette players or headsets are not allowed in class.
