COURSE OUTLINE FOR JUNIOR PAINTING AR1120 A2/AR3130 A23

- **Where:** Studio A
- **When:** Tuesday and Thursday 2:30 to 5:30
- **What:** Painting I is an introductory-level studio course that will introduce the basic concepts of painting, colour theory and perception. Various approaches and conceptual attitudes will be examined to broaden the student's appreciation of painting and visual culture.

OBJECTIVES

Students upon completion of this course will:

1. Exhibit a working knowledge of the fundamentals of easel painting including:
 - The various characteristics of acrylic paint.
 - The preparation of a variety of painting supports (masonite, stretched canvas, found support and others.)
 - Various ways of applying paint, advantages and disadvantages, both traditional and experimental.
 - Paint and collage.
2. Identify and apply fundamental principles of composition as related to painting (harmony, balance, rhythm, repetition, dominance, variety) using the elements of visual art (line, shape, value, texture and colour.)
3. Perspective, using the principles of depth perception to record the illusion of three dimensions using: overlapping, advancing and receding colour, mechanical perspective, atmospheric perspective, diminishing size and detail, tonal modeling.
4. Perceive visual relationships in the environment and record these perceptions as paintings (paint on a flat surface.)
5. Develop confidence and competence in the verbal discussion of these topics

READING AND/OR HOME ASSIGNMENTS:

- Students can expect to put in a minimum of **TWELVE (12) HOURS PER WEEK** on out-of-class work.
