COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Infant Toddler Care is a practical course which examines the characteristics of quality programs for infants and toddlers and explores programming techniques which respond to the individual and group needs of children up to 36 months of age. The focus of this course is on developing an awareness of the critical importance of care and interaction in the lives of infants and toddlers.

PREREQUISITIES:

Successful completion of first year or consent of the department.

TEXT:

No purchased test is required. Appropriate infant/toddler library resources will be used.

OBJECTIVES:

Upon successful completion of the course, you will be able to:

- describe the characteristics of high quality infant and toddler care settings
- describe the developmental physical, social, emotional, cognitive, and play abilities of infants and toddlers
- select and provide materials and experiences that support and enhance all aspects of infants' and toddlers' development

- describe and demonstrate appropriate caregiving strategies including styles of interacting and methods of guiding behavior
- assist parents in their role

TEACHING METHODS:

Lecture with collaborative learning
