**COURSE DESCRIPTION:** This course provides an interesting look at the diverse forms, functions, and needs of Canadian families. Students will learn about societal influences on families and children, and the role of the early childhood practitioner in supporting children and their families.

**OBJECTIVES:** On successful completion of this course, you should be able to:

- Describe the diversity of family forms and the needs of families
- Describe social, economic, and political influences on contemporary Canadian families
- Describe the impact of various challenges on children and their families
- Identify family-centered caregiver strategies
- Identify community resources available for children and their families

**TEACHING METHODS:** Lectures will incorporate A.V. materials, handout and text readings, in-and out-of-class activities and assignments, and guest speakers.

**GRADING POLICY:** A final grade of 4 must be obtained to pass this course. Final grades will be based on: Assignments - 95% Attendance/Participation - 5%
