COURSE DESCRIPTION: This course provides an interesting look at the diverse forms, functions, and needs of Canadian families. Students will learn about societal influences on families and children, and the role of the early childhood practitioner in supporting children and their families.

PREREQUISITE: Completion of first year or consent of the department

Note: Credit will be granted for CD2090 or the combination of CD2090 and CD2110

OBJECTIVES: On successful completion of this course, you should be able to:

- Describe the diversity of family forms and the needs of families
- Describe social, economic, and political influences on contemporary Canadian families
- Describe the impact of various challenges on children and their families
- Identify family-centered caregiver strategies
- Identify community resources available for children and their families

TEACHING METHODS: Lectures will incorporate A.V. materials, handout and text readings, in-and out-of-class activities and assignments, and guest speakers.

- III. Family-centered practice
 - A. The needs of families
 - B. Forming partnerships with families
 - C. The families' role in early childhood programs
 - D. The role of the early childhood practitioner

- IV. Supporting children and their families
 - A. Helping children cope with stress
 - B. Community resources
