# ISSUES AND OPTIONS IN CHILDCARE

1988-89

### COMPETENCY ONE

Students will be familiar with the legislation and finances involved in operating a daycare centre.

- 1. Review the historical development of daycare in Canada.
- 2. Review and discuss Canada's childcare policy.
- Critically assess the Alberta legislation and policy manual for quality daycare.

Areas to consider are:

- staff qualifications
- child/staff ratio
- space requirements
- health & safety
- discipline
- programming
- Analyze a daycare centre's operating budget and become familiar with financial contributions from the Alberta Covernment, (i.e. operating allowances and subsidy)
- Plan a hypothetical daycare budget based on Alberta government contributions and current parent fees. Analyze the feasibility of quality care and equitable staff wages given the present fee structure.

### COMPETENCY TWO

Students will be familiar with the different types of daycare options available to parents, as well as the governing bodies for non-profit centres and private centres.

 Research and discuss the following types of childcare and examine the advantages and disadvantages of each:

> Private Daycare Non-Profit Daycare Parent Cooperatives Family Day Homes Work Based Daycare Nannies

- Identify and discuss the structure and responsibilities of the governing bodies in relation to various types of daycare.
- Discuss potential management-employee problems and possible solutions to achieve good working relations.

#### COMPETENCY THREE

Students will be familiar with techniques and procedures involved in the process of advertising preschool programs.

- Discuss the advertising and intake procedures for daycares and play schools (enrollment, waiting list, fee allocation).
- Develop and implement an advertising strategy for Practicum IV, Spring Nursery Program.
- Investigate possible program options for Practicum IV, Spring Nursery.

### COMPETENCY FOUR

Students will be familiar with Job Search Techniques and interview procedures for Daycare and Preschool positions.

- Research and discuss job search techniques and write a personal resume for a position with preschool children.
- Develop a list of interview questions which could be used to determine the applicants suitability for a position in a preschool program.
- 3. Role play and discuss interview situations in class.

# COMPETENCY FIVE

Students will become familiar with the philosophy, standards and characteristics of Out-of-School Care programs.

# Learning Tasks:

- Discuss the purpose and philosophy of out-of-school care programs.
- Become familiar with standards and certification for programs and staff.
- 3. Discuss developmental characteristics of children ages 6-12 years.
- Examine the Out-of-School Care Environment, including age related interests and appropriate programming activities.
