DD1021 (A3): Popular Music in the Twentieth Century – 3 (3-0-0) 45 Hours for 15 Weeks

CALENDAR DESCRIPTION: This course explores major movements in North American popular music. Topics include blues, jazz, hillbilly, country, musical theatre, folk, and rock music.

COURSE OBJECTIVES: DD1021 is an introduction to a number of North American popular music styles. This course focuses on popular music from the late nineteenth century to the present day, with an emphasis on the evolution of the various musical styles and the placement of these styles in their social contexts. Both assigned readings and critical listening are important aspects of the course, and exams and quizzes will reflect material from readings and recordings. In addition to the required text, additional readings may occasionally be assigned. When you have completed this course, you should have a good perspective of the history and evolution of popular music in North America over the past century.

LEARNING OUTCOMES: Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to demonstrate knowledge and understanding of the ways popular music has developed and the people and forces who drove those developments. Additionally, students will be able to aurally identify the aesthetic and stylistic characteristics of many genres of popular music.

You will demonstrate your knowledge and understanding of an aspect of the course through a research project resulting in the creation of a formal academic paper. Topics must be chosen in consultation with the instructor. A proposal of your intended project will be due by the start of class on **February 08**. If an acceptable proposal is not submitted by this date, a topic will be assigned to you. The finished paper will be due by the start of class on **March 29**.

Late term papers will be assessed a penalty of 10% each calendar day until the paper is submitted. If a term paper is not submitted, students will not be allowed to write the final exam, and a grade of zero will be recorded for both the paper and the exam; you must submit a paper to pass this course.
