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DRAMA 1010: ATTENDANCE POLICY

Drama 1010 is not a correspondence course. Textbook and assigned readings are intended to supplement not duplicate lectures, discussions and in-class activities. Therefore, regular attendance is expected of all students (as, indeed, it is in all courses). Students having an inordinate number of unexcused absences may be debarred from final examination, or, in this course, from final projects, resulting in failure. For this course, unexcused absences in excess of 10% of the total number of classes is considered to be an "inordinate" number.

All absences must be explained in writing. In the case of absence for medical reason, this must be in the form of a note from a doctor in order to be excused. Generally speaking, only those absences due to medical emergencies, death, accident en route to class, or extreme weather conditions for students living outside Grande Prairie will be excused.
