CALENDAR DESCRIPTION: Speech and movement improvisation with an emphasis on imaginative development will be included. It will be an introduction to the process of acting and to dramatic form.

**DELIVERY MODE(S): Laboratory** 

COURSE CONTENT: The course flows between individual physical training, group physical training, improvisational exercises and group creation, practice, and presentation. Activities will include a physical warm up, acting/improv. exercises, ensemble exercises, creating, rehearsing, and presenting scenes within class. There will be a public performance of the final scenes on April 14 in conjunction with the other acting classes. Students will write a number of reflections of their learning process and will write a final reflective paper for the course. Students must commit to rehearsal time outside of class. Students are expected to attend the Visitor in the Arts event on March 4 during Community Hour. Students are invited to attend performances of the GPLT winter and spring productions, Ovations Showcase

Centre productions, and <u>must attend</u> The GPRC Theatre Rising production of "Last Chance Leduc" and the Theatre for Living performance of "Maladjusted" on Feb. 21. They will write a response paper on one of the live theatre productions available during the course.

## **LEARNING OUTCOMES**

Upon completion of the course the students will have gained a more critical and sophisticated understanding of the following:

- their personal growth and development in relationship to creating and acting a character
- group process in dramatic ensemble and scene creation
- increased physical and vocal capacity and responsivity
- critical analysis of live theatre performance and audience response

## **EVALUATION:**

<u>Evaluation</u>: Evaluation is based on individual process and development (20%), presentation of scenes (45%), reflections (15%), response paper (10%), and reflective paper (10%). There will be a student teacher consultation at mid-term and the end of term to discuss the student's progress and the instructor is always available for student-initiated consultation. Late assignments will not be accepted unless by prior arrangement.

<u>Required materials</u>: Students need to have comfortable, flexible clothing (no zippers, or belts) that they use for class. No jewelry is to be worn during class.

<u>Additional Costs</u>: Students may choose to purchase costume and prop items for their scenes. Any purchases will remain the student's own property. Theatre tickets are the responsibility of the student.

#### **Assignments:**

<u>Scenes:</u> Students will work in groups of 3 to 4 people to create 3 original scenes. You will be responsible for completing a Character Development Worksheet for each scene. It is expected that you will rehearse your scenes extensively outside of class time. The final scene will be performed for the public at the end of term Drama Scenes.

<u>Reflections</u>: Students will write 7 reflections (250 to 500 words) with notes on class activities, assigned topics, rehearsals, performances, visitors, their questions and observations. Reflections may also include artwork, creative writing, clippings ... The purpose of the Reflection is for the student to think critically and analytically about the work they are doing and what they are learning in the class. Reflections will also assist the Midterm and Endterm interviews. DO NOT LOSE YOUR REFLECTIONS AS THEY ARE YOUR NOTES FOR THE REFLECTIVE PAPER.

<u>Reflective Paper</u>: Students will write a summative Reflective Paper that will draw on their weekly reflections throughout the course. An assignment outline will be given mid March. Reflective papers should be 1500 to 2000 words in length.

<u>Response Paper:</u> Students will write a response paper about one live theatre performance. This response paper assignment will be made available early in the course and is due one week after seeing the performance.

# **Evaluation Criteria:**

<u>Individual Process and Development in class</u> (20%). Individual process and development is assessed for the midterm evaluation (10%) and the endterm evaluation (10%).

- 1) serious participation in class physical training and exercises
- 2) discipline in training
- 3) co-operation within class setting
- 4) contribution to group discussion
- 5) analysis and critical thinking
- 6) feedback to other students

Scene Work (45%). The first scene is worth 10%; the second scene is worth 15%, and the third scene is worth 20% of the total mark. In the scene work, 1/3 of the mark is based on your character development and preparation, 1/3 on your workshop/coaching, and 1/3 on your performance.

- 1) proactive contribution to group process of scene creation
- 2) scene and character research assignments
- 3) professionalism and dependability in rehearsal and performance
- 4) focus, presence, adaptability in rehearsal and performance
- 5) originality in character and scene creation

Reflective Writings (15%). There are 7 assignments. A focus will be given for each assignment.

Each writing will be graded out of 10 on the following:

- 1) critical reflection on class work and process
- 2) critical reflection on scene work
- 3) creativity
- 4) quality of discussion of assigned focus

Reflective Paper (10%). The paper will be graded on:

- 1) ability to summarize and draw connections between the Reflective Writings
- 2) attention to observed details
- 3) critical analysis and questions raised
- 4) clarity of writing (includes grammar, punctuation, spelling)
- 5) structure of paper (introduction, discussion, conclusion)

Response Paper (10%). The paper will be graded on:

- 1) ability to summarize the content of the play
- 2) awareness of the context of the play
- 3) ability to reflect critically on the different elements of the theatre production scenography, acting, directing, marketing

**Grading** will be according to the criteria commonly used within a BFA acting program:

**A** (85-89) to **A+** (90-100) Shows an understanding and ability to handle basic material\*, Shows competency and evidence of growth in work, Shows ability to control and develop material, <u>Shows Originality in Handling Material</u>.

**A-** (80-84) Shows an understanding and ability to handle basic material, Shows competency and evidence of growth in work, <u>Shows ability to control and develop</u> material

**B+** (76-79) Shows an understanding and ability to handle basic material, Shows competency and evidence of growth in work

**B-** (68-71) to **B** (72-75) Shows an understanding and <u>ability to handle basic material</u>

**C+** (64-67) Shows an adequate understanding of material.

\* "Material" means the physical training, exercises, scene work, rehearsals, and any other aspects of the course.

Any changes to this syllabus will be discussed in class.
