Course Description

Information in this course will relate directly to the practice of teaching. The specific topics covered are arranged according to four general themes: student development; classroom learning and instruction; learner diversity; individual differences in students; and student motivation.

Class Format

Classes will consist of lectures, discussions, activities, presentations and videos.

Course Objectives

The student will be able to:

- 1. Describe and explain students' mental, physical, emotional and social development.
- Understand the diverse needs of the learners and how to adapt instructions to meet these needs.

- Become aware of cultural diversity and the need to create a culturally compatible classroom.
- Discuss the major perspectives of learning theories and their implications for instruction.
- Become aware of the various strategies for motivating, managing and teaching today's students.

Professionalism

- Attendance Students will be responsible for lectures delivered, assigned readings, and for any announcements that will be made in class. If a student is unable to attend a particular class, it will be her/his responsibility to find out what was missed. Poster Presentation

Poster presentation topics and instructions will be given to you in class later in the term. The poster should be no larger than 11 x 17 inches in size. Group Presentation

The group in class presentation will be a verbal presentation of a case study analysis. The presentation should be about 15 minutes in length and all group members will be expected to participate. You should be prepared to answer questions, and ask them of other groups. Similar to the poster presentation you should come prepared to do your presentation on the day scheduled other wise you will receive a grade of 0%.
