CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:

This course is designed to provide students in Education with a working knowledge of important concepts and issues in Educational Psychology. Topics to be addressed include student development, learning and instruction, student abilities, and classroom motivation. The course will focus on information related to the practice of teaching.

- The aspects of memory and their reciprocal relationship with behavioral and other mental processes
- The cognitive processes involved in language comprehension and production, as well as problem solving and reasoning
- The aspects of motivation and their impact on learning.
- The process of formal and informal evaluation and assessment of students' knowledge
