**CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:** In this course, students work to improve their reading comprehension by studying various genres including short stories, drama, poetry, and non-fiction. There will be opportunities for both oral and written expression (paragraphs and essays) with a focus on mastery of punctuation, grammar, and sentence construction.

#### **COURSE OBJECTIVES:**

- Students will understand the importance of literature as a way of examining societal values and the human experience.
- Students will gain the tools to analyze literature and develop into competent academic writers.
- Students' writing will undergo many states of revision and they will understand that writing is a process.
- Students will be able to use information from various sources and compose well- developed pieces of academic writing.

## **LEARNING OUTCOMES:**

The study of English Language Arts empowers students to understand and appreciate literature as well as the world around them. It enables students to understand and appreciate language and to use it confidently for a variety of purposes. As a result of taking this course, students will gain the ability to:

- Explore thoughts, ideas, feelings and experiences.
- Understand literature and other texts in oral, print, visual and multimedia forms, and respond personally, critically and creatively.
- Collect and manage ideas and information.
- Create oral, print, visual and multimedia texts, and enrich the clarity and artistry of communication.
- Respect, support and collaborate with others in learning.
- Read and respond to a variety of writing including current events, fiction and poetry.
- Understand that writing has many purposes that are applicable to life in and out of school.

These learning outcomes are interrelated and interdependent. The application of computer technology in the writing process is essential for success. Students will use technology to access, use, and communicate information, and critically assess reliability and validity of electronically accessed information. Students will use summarization skills and quote correctly from sources. Students will also work towards improving grammar, mechanics, punctuation, fluency, and clarity of expression.

#### **COURSE SCHEDULE/TENTATIVE TIMELINE:**

At the start of each month and unit, I post a monthly calendar on MyClass that will outline the reading schedule and important dates for assignments and tests. At the end of each week (typically on Fridays unless specified otherwise in class), I assess students' understanding of course content with in-person quizzes. At the end of each major unit of study, students will demonstrate their understanding of course content by writing in-person unit tests and submitting major essays.

In addition to novels and plays of study, students will practice reading and writing skills through Kelly Gallagher's Sentence of the Week & Article of the Week.

- Weeks 1-4: Students will explore Harper Lee's To Kill a Mockingbird and a sampling of fictional and non-fictional texts.
- Weeks 5-9: Students will explore John Wyndham's The Chrysalids and a collection of science fiction short stories.
- Weeks 10-11: Students will explore poetry and poetic devices.
- Weeks 12-15: Students will explore the life and times of William Shakespeare and his play *Romeo & Juliet*.

#### STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES:

- 1. **Good attendance** is a requirement of this course and of academic success generally. Students have the option to attend this class in-person or remotely. I recommend that students email me in advance regarding foreseeable absence(s) from class. Students should consult My-Class and adhere to set deadlines regardless of any absence(s).
- 2. **All quizzes, unit-tests, and the final exam must be taken in-person.** Students should consult My-Class monthly and weekly calendars to ensure that they are in class for assessments. Quizzes/Unit Tests will generally take place on Fridays.

- 3. Good attendance means more than simply being present physically during in-person or remote class time. It means coming to class prepared, having read the assigned material(s) for the day, and showing respect to all the other members of the class by being attentive. To maximize student engagement and learning, I highly encourage students attend classes in-person or to turn on their web cameras and fully participate in classroom activities via Zoom.
- 4. **Students must check their GPRC email and MyClass regularly.** This is essential to keep up with the course readings, assignments and tests. I also encourage students to add their GPRC email and MyClass to their personal phone/device.
- 5. Submit all formal assignments via My-Class Assignment Drop Boxes unless otherwise specified. If students are having trouble submitting assignments via My-Class, they can email their assignments to <a href="mailto:LBrazier@gprc.ab.ca">LBrazier@gprc.ab.ca</a>. Assignments should be sent as Microsoft Word Documents, PDFs, or Power Points. If students choose to use Google Docs or Google Slides- when sharing, please make sure that as an instructor I can edit/comment directly on documents submitted.
- 6. All assignments are to be submitted by the assigned date and no later than 4:00 pm unless otherwise specified in class. Late assignments will be penalized 10% per day, with weekends counting as one day. After three days, I will no longer accept the assignment for marking. I will grant extensions for assignments in extenuating circumstances only. Last-minute requests for extensions will not be granted unless medical/or other professional documentation can be provided. Please note that I will not accept any outstanding assignments after I have handed back marked assignments to the class (Turnaround time for marked assignments is usually about one week).
- 7. Students should avoid making travel plans for the 15 week duration of this course. All tests (this includes quizzes, unit tests and the final exam) MUST be written in-person and at the scheduled times unless PRIOR arrangements have been made with the instructor. Most tests will take place on Fridays. A missed test will result in a score of ZERO on that test. Only in very specific cases may student be given an opportunity to make up a missed test. Doctor, lawyer or police documentation may be required. Do not book vacation in this time.
