COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is designed to develop basic composition skills to prepare you for further high school English courses. While some attention will be paid to forms of literature such as short stories and poetry, the main focus of the course is on writing paragraphs and essays. LL0110, a co-requisite of this course, is designed to improve your grammatical, mechanical, vocabulary, and reading comprehension skills. Spelling will be noted in all your work.

Prerequisite: EN0090 or EN0100 or equivalent placement test score.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

Upon completion of the course, students will be able to

- · use basic rules of organization to write a variety of paragraphs and essays
- use pre-writing strategies such as outlining, diagraming, mapping, and free writing to plan paragraphs and essays
- use steps in the writing process to write a paragraph or essay which makes a point and supports it
- evaluate writing by correcting errors in unity, support, coherence, and sentence skills
- demonstrate knowledge of various organizational patterns such as process, cause and effect, compare and contrast, classification, description, and argument by writing paragraphs and essays which follow these forms
- · identify and discuss elements of fiction found in selected short stories, and drama
- · identify and discuss elements of poetry
- illustrate understanding of elements of selected types of poetry by using them in writing poetry
- use writing techniques to complete a resume package
- use summarization skills, paraphrasing, and quoting correctly from sources and apply to writing

CLASS FORMAT:

This English course includes a combination of lecture, discussion, oral presentations, individual lab, and group work.

GRADING/EVALUATING:

Students require a grade of 65% or better in order to continue to the next English level.
