**CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:** This course includes a study of the five basic forms in literature: essays, short stories, novels, drama and poetry. Both oral presentations and written compositions are required - mainly personal responses, essays and one major research paper.

**CREDIT/CONTACT HOURS:** 6 hours/week

**DELIVERY MODE(S):** The course work includes lectures, small group/class discussions, student presentations, quizzes/unit tests, in-class exercises, and written compositions (response papers). The course design allows students to develop and to utilize academic communication skills.

**COURSE OBJECTIVES:** The aims of this course are to provide students with the skills and tools necessary to think critically about a range of literary texts and to communicate ideas in a clear, coherent, and persuasive manner. Students will have the chance, individually and in groups, to consider, analyze, and discuss different forms of writing; in so doing, students will have opportunities to improve oral and written communication skills.

# **LEARNING OUTCOMES:** As a result of taking this course, students will gain the ability to:

- Identify and to employ a range of sentence structures
- Improve elements of mechanics, usage, and grammar
- Improve general and academic vocabulary
- Develop appropriate strategies for reading and responding to difficult materials
- Practice and improve reading comprehension and critical thinking skills
- Plan an essay, moving from outlining, to writing a first draft, to revising, editing, and submitting.
- Develop an understanding of essay components such as thesis statements and topic sentences
- Produce coherent, unified, and well-structured essays
- Research effectively
- Analyze aspects of plot, setting, characterization, tone, and theme in short stories, novels, drama, and poetry
- Discuss a writer's point of view and how it relates to a work's larger themes
- Identify and analyze important details in a given text
- Identify devices of figurative language such as metaphor, irony, allusion

### COURSE SCHEDULE/TENTATIVE TIMELINE:

Throughout the course, students will engage in a variety of short prose fiction and non-fiction texts as well as poetry. In addition to these forms of texts, the course will cover the following units of study:

Weeks 1-4: Non-Fiction Prose/ Memoir: Educated by Tara Westover and Research Paper

Weeks 5-7: Drama: Shakespeare's *Othello*, EN30-1 Diploma Practice (multiple choice, personal response and essay assessments) and Final Review/Final Exam.

Generally, literary devices presentations will take place on Tuesdays and grammar presentations will take place on Wednesdays. The weekly quizzes will assess the students' mastery of vocabulary, concepts, and readings covered throughout the week.

### STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES:

- 1. Good attendance is a requirement of this course and of academic success generally. If you are unable to attend class, please email me to confirm the reason for your absence. It is the responsibility of the student to find out what material was missed via Moodle and fellow classmates.
- 2. Good attendance means more than simply being present physically during class time. It means coming to class prepared, having read the assigned material(s) for the day, and showing respect to all the other members of the class by being attentive. Disruptive activities for instance, habitually arriving late or leaving early will not be tolerated.

- 3. Cell phones are to be and kept out of sight and silent at all times. This means that cell phones may be used only as a learning resource- any phone calls, texts or other distracting behavior will not be tolerated.
- 4. **Submit all formal assignments as hard copies** This means that any electronic submissions of assignments will be docked 2%. Only Video Conference students may submit assignments via email to me without penalty at LBrazier@gprc.ab.ca
- 5. All assignments are to be submitted by the assigned date. Late assignments will be penalized 10% per day, with weekends counting as one day. After *three days*, I will no longer accept the assignment for marking. I will grant extensions for assignments in extenuating circumstances *only*. Last-minute requests for extensions will not be granted unless medical/or other professional documentation can be provided. Please note that I will not accept any unsubmitted assignments after I have handed back marked assignments to the class. (Turnaround time for marked assignments is usually about one week).
- 6. Students should avoid making travel plans until after the exam schedule has been set. All tests and quizzes/unit tests/exams MUST be written at the scheduled times unless PRIOR arrangements have been made with the instructor. A missed test (exam) will result in a score of ZERO on that test (exam). Only in very specific cases may student be given an opportunity to make up a missed exam (student may be presented with a different version of the exam). Doctor, lawyer or police documentation may be required. The final exam is 3 hours long and is scheduled by the registrars' office during GPRC Exam weeks. Do not book vacation in this time. The registrar will release the exam schedule during the semester; please note that absolutely no alternative examination dates will be considered except in the case of a medical emergency.
- 7. **Students are required to check the Moodle site for this course regularly**. Students should check it before each class to stay informed concerning course updates, readings, and announcements. It is the responsibility of the student, not the instructor, to print off readings and assignments from Moodle as necessary.
