Course Description:

This course concentrates on the construction of sentences and paragraphs appropriate for formal essays. Written assignments offer reviews of the conventions of formal English grammar and the mechanics of good writing and editing. There will be discussions and analyses of readings. Students will write a minimum of 16 in-class compositions. Instruction in research will also be provided.

Objectives:

The objective of this course is to increase the student's abilities to develop and support a thesis for a particular audience. Students will organize sentences and paragraphs to achieve unity and coherence. The course will stress the need to create a clear and concise thesis statement. Students will also be assisted in developing a writing style appropriate to the context and audience.

*The **Initiative Mark** is designed to encourage each student to initiate consultation with the instructor. Each student is expected to make at least *two* appointments during the semester. The student will then have the opportunity to go over draft assignments, seek extra resources or reflect on assignments/tests.

Class Participation:

Class participation grade is determined by evaluating a student's contribution to the classroom learning environment.

The criteria to assess "participation" are students' willingness and ability to:

- 1) attend classes
- 2) **respond** to questions
- 3) <u>ask</u> questions
- 4) **participate** in discussion

These criteria are not given separate grades, but a cumulative record of individual student contributions will be kept.

Good writing is good thinking expressed clearly.

Basic Expectations & Class Rules:

- 1) <u>Attend all classes</u>. Come prepared with assignments and readings completed. Be prepared to <u>participate</u> actively in your learning. <u>Composition is NOT a spectator sport!</u>
- 2) Essays may <u>not be accepted after the due date</u> unless prior arrangements have been made or compelling circumstances are demonstrated.
- 3) <u>Essays will lose marks</u> if they are significantly less or more than the **required** word length.
- 4) Students are required to make two copies of each of the three out-of-class essays.
- 5) <u>Each student is responsible</u> for any changes to this syllabus which may be announced when the student is not in class.
- 6) <u>Make-up tests</u> may not be permitted without a medical certificate or other appropriate documentation.
- 7) <u>Term work cannot be reconsidered</u> after the final exam has been written.
