Course Description:

This course reviews the elements of English grammar and the mechanics of good writing. It concentrates on the structures of sentences, paragraphs and essays. Written assignments offer practice in composition. There will be discussion and analyses of readings. Instruction in research will also be provided.

Objectives:

The objectives of this course are to develop the student's abilities to use appropriate means of development and support for a particular subject and audience. It will help students to organize sentences and paragraphs to achieve unity and coherence. Students will also be assisted to develop a writing style appropriate to the context.

Students will be required to write two formal essays.
