COURSE OUTLINE - EN 1201 (A4, SPRING 2012): COMPOSITION AND RHETORIC 3 (3-0-0) 45 HOURS

**PREREQUISITE(S)/COREQUISITE:** Successful completion of Alberta English 30 (or equivalent of grade 12 English). This course will fulfill 3 credits of requirements for most programs that specify 6 credits of first year or Junior English. Normally, no more than 6 credits of first year English or equivalent may be taken for credit.

## REQUIRED TEXT/RESOURCE MATERIALS:

- 1) Alfred Rosa and Paul Eschholz, *Models for Writers: Short Essays for Composition.* 10<sup>th</sup> ed. Bedford-St. Martin's, 2010.
- 2) John Patrick Shanley, Doubt: A Parable. Dramatists Play Service, 2005.
- 3) A writing handbook (with MLA, APA, grammar information, etc). There are several options such as *The Little Penguin Handbook* (2012), *Easy Writer* (2010), etc.

**CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:** This course will help students become more sophisticated users and producers of written texts. Instruction will include basic academic essay writing skills and the various rhetorical approaches used when addressing specific audiences. The main goals of the course are to help students integrate reading and writing and to become familiar with the conventions of college- (and university-) level writing. This includes producing coherent, logical texts that are relatively free of surface errors. To achieve these goals, the course encourages students to think critically, to read closely and analytically, and to compose responses to a variety of texts, both written and visual.

CREDIT/CONTACT HOURS: 3 (3-0-0) UT, 45 Hours

**DELIVERY MODE(S):** This section of EN 1201 (A4) will be a "blended" delivery course—mostly online with some face-to-face instruction. For details about dates, please see the course schedule. Essentially, you are required to guide your own learning, to take responsibility for your success in this course, and to engage with the community of EN 1201 that will be online through our Moodle site. There will be a number of assignments and activities that you must submit (and in which you must participate) through Moodle.

In order to accomplish the goals of EN 1201, we will read a great number of essays and pieces of literature as well as learn to break down our writing in order to organize and present our ideas more effectively. In addition, we will work through some fundamentals of grammar, expand our vocabularies, and work extensively with the rules of writing so that we may develop the ability to proofread and critique our own (and others') writing.

**OBJECTIVES:** Students who complete this course successfully should be able to:

- -use their writing to analyze thoughts and to express ideas effectively;
- -use their writing to respond critically to another piece of writing or to an external prompt;
- -plan, outline, and draft a piece of writing that develops a specific thesis (and incorporates outside sources appropriately using MLA or APA style formatting);
- -revise a text, adjusting style and content for specific purposes and audiences;
- -proofread writing for surface errors and correct the majority of these errors.
