### **CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:**

This course will explore a specific issue (to be determined by the instructor) using a variety of genres and media. Instruction will include essay writing skills.

**PREREQUISITE(S)/COREQUISITE:** Successful completion of Alberta English 30 (or equivalent of grade 12 English). This course will fulfill 3 credits of requirements for most programs that specify 6 credits of first year or Junior English. Normally, no more than 6 credits of first year English or equivalent may be taken for credit.

**COURSE OBJECTIVES:** Students will read and critically analyze a variety of science fiction texts, and articulate their conclusions in clear, structured writing, with an emphasis on academic essay forms.

**LEARNING OUTCOMES:** By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- Identify and describe a variety of science fiction subtypes
- Articulate in outline the history of the science fiction genre
- Critically analyze texts with reference to symbolic language, structure, and patterns of language
- Make connections between different texts in terms of both specific content and genre evolution
- Write academic literary analysis essays using science fiction texts as primary sources
