CALENDAR DESCRIPTION: This course involves studies in literatures in English from around the world. Instruction will include essay writing skills.

CREDIT/CONTACT HOURS: 3 credits / 3 hours per week

DELIVERY MODE(S): The course work includes lecture, class discussion, in-class quizzes, writing instruction and assignments.

OBJECTIVES: Students in this course will be introduced to a range of literatures written in English from around the world. Our goals will be to come to appreciate the diversity of perspective, style, and subject matter that is to be found in international literature. At the same time, we will work to strengthen our ability to analyze and discuss complex works of literature and to improve our argumentative and writing skills.

EVALUATIONS:

There will be **4** unannounced quizzes during the semester, of which only the top **3** will count toward your final grade. These quizzes *may* include material from lectures and/or readings from the previous three weeks (i.e. If you are quizzed at the end of the fifth week, you *will not* be responsible for material from the second week or earlier). There will be **no** quizzes in the final two weeks of the semester. A final examination will be scheduled in December by the registrar; students should avoid making travel plans before this exam date is available.

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES:

1. Written assignments are to be submitted directly to me as a hard copy. I will not accept electronic copies. It is the student's responsibility to retain a copy of ALL assignments submitted for grading; in the unlikely event of theft or loss, a duplicate copy must be available upon request.

2. Written assignments are to be submitted *on time*. This means that they are due *before the beginning of class*. Late assignments will incur a penalty of 5% per day, with weekends counting as one day. Assignments more than one week late forfeit the right to full commentary.

3. Extensions will not be granted for written assignments except in extenuating circumstances. Documentation will be required.

4. Students are expected to attend *all* classes. Unexcused absences will negatively affect the participation component of a student's grade.

5. Participation is not a mere formality but a vital part of the college learning experience. By responding to and posing questions, students become active participants in their own educational development. That said, I am aware that not all students will feel equally comfortable speaking in front of their peers; this difference in temperament need not result in any student receiving a lower grade for participation as there are multiple ways in which students should feel free to participate beyond the classroom. These include, but are not limited to, email conversations with me regarding the readings, lectures, or discussions, or coming to office hours to continue an in-class discussion. Students are also *highly* encouraged to make use of Moodle as a forum for continuing the discussion beyond the classroom.

6. Students are required to check the Moodle site for this course before each class

to stay informed concerning course updates and announcements.

7. Cellphones are to be turned off and kept out of sight during class time. Students who text while the instructor and/or other students are speaking will lose marks for participation.
