The dynamics of gender and sexuality in literary and other cultural texts and the critical concepts and methods key to their study.

DELIVERY MODE: Lecture and discussion

COURSE OBJECTIVES: Students will read and critically analyze literary texts and non-fiction essays exploring issues surrounding gender and sexuality. They will articulate their conclusions in clear, structured writing with an emphasis on academic critical forms.

LEARNING OUTCOMES: By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- Identify and articulate crucial concepts regarding gender and sexuality
- Integrate those concepts into larger cultural discussions
- Make connections between those concepts and a variety of literary texts
- Articulate how gender politics play out in contemporary writing.
- Integrate ideas of gender politics into senior-level academic essays
