**CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:** An introduction to the dynamics of colonization and its resistances in literary and other cultural texts and to the critical concepts and methods key to their study.

**DELIVERY MODE(S):** The course work includes lecture, class discussion, in-class quizzes, oral presentations, and written assignments.

**COURSE OBJECTIVES:** The aims of this course are to introduce students to a range of texts and concepts central to the study of post-colonial literatures. Through a reading of texts from the Americas, Africa, South Asia, and Australia, students will have the chance to become conversant with the key questions, debates, and issues in the field of post-colonial literary studies. Ultimately,

we will attempt to gain an understanding of what makes post-colonial literatures a vibrant, distinct, and diverse body of writing within a global literary context.

**LEARNING OUTCOMES:** After taking this course, the successfully participating students will demonstrate the following:

- Familiarity with, and the ability to employ, terminology relevant to the understanding of post-colonial literatures and post-colonial theory
- Awareness of the importance of context and intertexts in post-colonial writings
- An ability to perform close textual analysis and to relate theoretical and historical sources to the primary texts under consideration
- An ability to perform research and incorporate secondary materials effectively and responsibly into written assignments

## STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES:
