### **Course Description**

The seventeenth century presents an array of voices and perspectives engaged in the social, religious, and political conflicts and movements that defined the period. Its seminal developments range from religious nonconformity to scientific inquiry, and from scriptural translation to radical pamphleteering. The course will explore the works of numerous authors, including Donne, Herbert, Lanyer, Fell, Herrick, Vaughan, and Bunyan. The course will also include an overview of the most influential text of the seventeenth century, the King James Bible, first published in 1611.
