ENGLISH 3760 Canadian Literature: Contemporary and Post-modern from 1969 to present

CREDITS: 3 (3-0-0) 1 semester LEVEL: Senior English Literature

PREREQUISITE: 6 credits of Junior UT English

APPLICABLE PROGRAMS: BA English, BA Can. Studies, BA General, B. ED.

METHOD OF DELIVERY: GPRC classroom mode--lecture & seminar. GPRC Bookstore supplies all texts.

CLASS SIZE: The maximum is 35 students.

CLASS SCHEDULE: Jan. 6- Apr.14 W 6 pm to 8:50 p.m.

SCOPE: EN 3760 is a critical survey of the move from high modernism in Canadian Literature to Postmodern and contemporary Canadian Literature in several genres. It concentrates mainly on Canadian Literature in English from 1970 to the present. The course covers several genres emphasizing the ones in which Canadians have been more widely acclaimed. Students study literature from a cross-section of Canadian regions and cultures, and learn to evaluate some of the standard literary theories about Canadian themes, Canadian identity, and changing literary forms.

CALENDAR DESCRIPTION: A study of contemporary and post-modern works written since the 1960's by Canadian authors like Laurence, Highway, Munro, Ondaatje, Urquhart, MacLeod, Vanderhaeghe, Crozier, Brand and Wayman.

EVALUATION:2 researched essays: 1st 7 pp/3 critics, & 2nd 8 pages, 4 critics min. 25% & 30%
1 oral seminars not always from researched essays15%
2 short in-class essay at the end of the semester 30 to 50 lines each

Essays lose substantial marks if they are less than the minimum-word length (this does not include quoted support). All essays must be typed. MLA standards are required for documentation and format. Attendance and discussion is required as part of the participation grade. Penalties for plagiarism (see definition in Student Handbook) are enforced. Late essays are penalized and essays more than 3 days late <u>need not be</u> accepted without written permission from the instructor. Students that do not show up when they are to do a presentation may not receive credit for the assignment, or may lose substantial grades *if*, at the instructor's discretion, they are allowed to present at an alternative time.

INSTRUCTIONAL DESIGN & CURRICULUM:

Students do seminars on individual works, followed by class discussion and lectures. Lectures address theme, style and structure, and background material in the culture and history that influences the work. Chronology dictates the units to some extent, although movements and developments in genres also influence the order of study. Students learn to appreciate and critique the literature through expository essays, seminar presentation, and verbal discussion at acceptable standards. Lectures, student seminars, film, group discussion, participation in literary readings, critical research and writing are employed toward these ends.
