CALENDAR DESCRIPTION: A study of contemporary and postmodern works written since 1960 by Canadian authors like Laurence, Highway, Munro, Ondaatje, Urquhart, MacLeod, Vanderhaeghe, Crozier, Brand and Wayman.

CREDIT/CONTACT HOURS: 3 credits / 3 hours per week

DELIVERY MODES: Discussion/seminar, lecture.

OBJECTIVES: The course is designed to introduce students to a selection of Canadian literature in various genres published in the last fifty years, with an emphasis on questions about nationality and literature in a multicultural state.

LEARNING OUTCOMES: After taking EN3760, students will be able to:

- Name and discuss important recent Canadian authors, works, and movements.
- Read critically for style and content.
- Orally present their ideas about literature and context.
- Plan, research and write advanced literary essays.
