CALENDAR DESCRIPTION: A study of contemporary and postmodern works written since 1960 by Canadian authors like Atwood, Laurence, Munro, Ondaatje, Urquhart, MacLeod, Vanderhaeghe, and others.

CREDIT/CONTACT HOURS: EN 3760 consists of two 80-minute classes per week.

DELIVERY MODE(S): Course work includes lectures, class discussions, group work, in-class quizzes, online assignments, and individual student work, both written and oral.

OBJECTIVES: We will encounter Canadian Literature written in the latter decades of the 20th century and into the 21st century, with the aim to consider them in relation to relevant contemporary social, cultural and political topics. We will attempt to explore the various ways in which Canadian writers participate in the shaping of Canadian literature, in relation to our particular history, geography and culture. Students learn to appreciate and critique the literature through discussion, seminar presentation, critical research and writing, film, and lecture.
