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Course Description: A variable-content seminar on major authors such as Dickens, Faulkner, Hemingway, Joyce, Laurence, and the Brontes. This semester we will focus our attention on much of Jane Austen's corpus and the time period in which she lived and wrote (mid- to late-Romantic and Regency). Discussions and lectures will be centred around Austen's major novels but will include her juvenilia and letters. In addition, we will consider filmic interpretations of major Austen titles and question the success/failure of such endeavours.

Pre-Requisite and University Transfer: Students must have taken six credits of Junior English not including EN1201. This course can be taken as often as desired provided course content differs. Transfer: UA, UC, UL, Augustana Faculty/UA, CUC, KUC. Consult Alberta Transfer Guide for full details.

Required Texts (available at the GPRC Bookstore):

✓ Austen, *Eight Books in One* (Shoes and Ships and Sealing Wax Ltd., 2005).

Note #1: You are free to use any editions of Austen's novels that you please provided they are <u>UN</u>abridged. Also be sure that the editions list continuous, individual chapter numbers—this will ease your ability to refer to specific passages during our discussions. I would be happy to look at your editions if you are unsure.

Note #2: You may be required to retrieve readings from the Library's course reserves and from Blackboard (specific titles will be mentioned in class).

Note #3: You are expected to use MLA formatting (6th or 7th edition) for all typed assignments. You may want to obtain an MLA Handbook for your own edification.

Course Format: Some lectures will be delivered but this course will focus mostly on class discussion and activities. You are expected to attend every class on time and be prepared to ask questions, to raise issues you find interesting/puzzling, and to be willing to engage with other students in a respectful, mature, and academic way. Participation will help you engage with and understand the material. Being physically present without actively taking part does not constitute "good" participation.

Revisions lacking the original, marked version will NOT be accepted. Period.
