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Course Title: Beginner's German I

CREDITS: German 1200 and German 1300 combined are equivalent to the

University of Alberta's German 100, worth 6 university transfer

credits.

COURSE DESCRIPTION: German 1200 and 1300 together are equivalent to the French 10,

20, and 30 programs in high school. Obviously, because our two courses include approximately the same content contained in the

three-course high school program, they are fairly intense. Nevertheless, you should understand that German 1200 is a beginner's course. No prior knowledge of German is required or

expected.

In German 1200, you will be introduced to all four language skill areas: listening, speaking, reading, and writing. You will practice the sounds of German and their relationship to spelling. You will learn basic vocabulary, common expressions for conversation as well as grammar and sentence structures. You will progressively learn to engage in simple conversations about every-day topics, understand texts about German speaking countries and their culture and develop your German writing skills through a variety of

activities.

If you already have credit in high school German 20, you should

probably begin your study with German 1300.

ATTENDANCE:

As new language structures will be introduced daily, class attendance is <u>essential</u>. Your habits related to attendance, punctuality and participation will undoubtedly manifest themselves in your grades.

CLASSROOM ACTIVITIES:

This course is based on the first 6 Chapters in <u>Treffpunkt Deutsch</u>. The textbook presents vocabulary and structures, linked to various themes and practice exercises. Most of our in-class time will focus on the textbook material.

Besides the textbook, there is a student activities manual, which will give you written and oral practice using language elements introduced in the textbook.

The written activities and exercises in this manual are to be completed on your own. The lab (oral) work will be completed in class.

OUTSIDE ACTIVITIES:

Language acquisition depends on contact with and use of the language. You are, therefore, encouraged to expose yourself as much as possible to the language outside of the classroom. Here are some suggestions:

- Find someone to converse with, another class member to study and practice with.

COMPOSITIONS:

You will be asked to write two compositions: a short in-class composition (about 200 words) with a subject to be announced at the time and one 250-300 word composition to be written out of class and for which you may chose your topic from one of the themes of the chapters that were covered.

You will complete these essays in the second half of the semester when you are better founded in the language.

TESTING:

Regular self and instructor-administrated evaluation is the key to progress. Testing will take several forms:

- Chapter Quizzes Short written quizzes to check your knowledge of vocabulary and/or grammar presented in the lessons or points (numbered 1-6) Expect approximately one every week.
- 2. Chapter Tests Each « Kapitel » comprises 6 lessons or points. Upon completion of the chapter, two tests will be given:
 - a. Written Chapter Test A 40-45 minute test to examine your facility with the vocabulary and structures covered in the chapter.

- **3.** *Final Exam -* A final, comprehensive exam consisting of both written and oral parts will be scheduled by the Registrar. YOU MUST NOT PLAN FAMILY VACATIONS PRIOR TO THE END OF THE FINAL EXAMS PERIOD!
- **4. Self-Evaluation** There will be numerous opportunities to monitor your own progress. These include the student activity manual exercises for which an answer key is provided.
