CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:

This course is designed as an introductory survey of global history and will provide a foundation for advanced study in history and related fields. It covers the major political, cultural, intellectual and economic developments of the world from the 15th century through the 18th century.

All assignments will be submitted electronically via Moodle. This procedure will be demonstrated in class.

All assignments are to be submitted before midnight on the due date. Students will have a three calendar day grace period to submit work after the due date. Work submitted after the three day grace period but before ten days after the due date will be penalized 25%. Work submitted more than ten days after the grace period will not be accepted for grading and students will receive a 0% for the assignment. Extensions beyond the grace period will only be considered when students contact the instructor prior to the deadline and present evidence of extenuating circumstances.

Students will be assessed on their research, synthesis and writing in the course assignments. The presentation of information in terms of organization and writing will be given equal weight in grading to the research and analysis.

There will be a midterm exam scheduled during class in October and a final exam written during the exam period in December.
