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HI2370 – THE HISTORY OF THE CANADIAN NORTH 3(3-0-0) UT
Fall 2001

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Description:

Since 1970, a good deal has been written on the history of the Canadian North and this course will concentrate on the history of the western portion of our North, from Hudson Bay to the Pacific, and from the 55th parallel to the Arctic. This university transfer credit (3) course is designed to provide a general view of major stages of human and economic development in the Canadian North, both north of 60 and the 'forgotten' provincial north between 55 and 60, and a more detailed view of the historical experience of the Peace River Country. Community members as individuals or as administrators/managers in our northern region, along with teachers and undergraduates in a wide variety of disciplines, will find this course of value personally and professionally.
